Students who attend the College, along with their whānau, are expected to support our Special Character. This support includes full participation by students in the school's curriculum, observances and ceremonies and extra-curricular activities within and outside school hours.

Led by our Chaplain students participate in a variety of worship, such as; Chapel services, Easter and Advent services, Commissioning and Founders Day services, fundraising for and support of charitable organisations, and service projects within our community, and events and activities celebrating belonging including Whanaungatanga Day, Pride Week and Matariki.

History

St Oran's College was founded by the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand in 1958. It became integrated into the State School system under the Integration Act 1975 in January 1991.

By the mid-1950s Queen Margaret College, the only Presbyterian school for girls in Wellington, was over-crowded with a huge waiting list and could not accept more pupils resident in the Hutt Valley. The Chairman of the Board of Governors of Queen Margaret, Dr O C Mazengarb, is thought to have approached the Wellington Presbytery with the idea of founding a similar college in Lower Hutt. Presbytery passed the suggestion to the Reverend George Dallard who was at that time minister of St Stephen's Presbyterian Church in Lower Hutt.

In 1957 Mr Dallard gained official approval from the Presbytery for a Presbyterian College for girls in the Hutt Valley. He approached Dr A M (Sam) Rutherford, a member of St Stephen's congregation and a well-known obstetrician in Lower Hutt, and together they invited a number of men to a meeting at which Dr Mazengarb spoke, urging them to 'get on with it'.



Initially a steering committee of three looked extensively for a site for the new school which was found at 550 High Street with main road frontage. The property was owned by an Anglican Trust and the land could not be sold. Ultimately it was arranged to buy the existing building of a disused boys' orphanage – the former Anglican Boys Home – and to lease the land. Incorporation was undertaken and from 26 November 1958 the proposed school was known legally as the Hutt Valley Presbyterian College for Girls Incorporated.

In late 1958 a ten-member Board of Governors was formally established. All were thought to be Presbyterians and most attended either St Stephen's or Knox Church which ensured wide parish representation in central Lower Hutt.

The Board had to find a Headmistress and staff, decide on a name, motto, uniform, fees and curriculum. They were unanimous in the choice of motto, but the school's name caused considerable discussion. One suggestion, originally passed but later rejected, was Elgin Girls College. In February 1959, the name 'St Oran's College' was officially approved by Presbytery.

Miss Elizabeth Robertson MA was appointed Principal, joined by a single full-time staff member, Miss Joan Wilson. The school opened with 21 pupils on 4 February 1959.

About Our College

The Name of Our College

Our name, St Oran's College, honours St Oran, who, in AD563 travelled from Ireland with St Columba to settle on the Island of Iona. Illness prevented St Oran from accompanying Columba on his mission to bring Christianity to the Picts in Scotland, so he remained on Iona, offering prayers of intercession for the journey. St Columba attributed his success in Scotland to St Oran's prayers from Iona.

The Heraldry Of Our Crest

The St Oran's College Crest comprises four main elements. Each element contributes meaning to the Crest

- A walled crown with a cross represents an institution with a spiritual purpose
- The ring of glory links with Celtic Christianity
- The stars represents the Southern Hemisphere
- St Andrew's cross reflects our Scottish/Presbyterian tradition

General Information

House System

Students of the College are divided into four Houses, Columba, Macfarlane, McRae, and Rutherford, for the purpose of competition. Various inter-house trophies are contested each year, and these generate friendly rivalry and House spirit. Our Athletics Sports, Swimming Sports, Performing Arts, Public Speaking, and Winter Sports are all House Competitions. There are six Whānau Groups in each House.

Student Leadership

A Head Student, Head of College Council, Head of Special Character, Head of Arts, Head of Sports, Head of Academic, Head of Hauora, plus four Heads of Houses are appointed each year by the students and staff. These roles form the Senior Executive. All Year 13 students are involved in College leadership and their position in the College is indicated by the St Oran's Senior Badge. Year 12 students are encouraged to participate in all leadership activities to enable them to prepare for the responsibility of Year 13 level. Senior students meet regularly with the Principal, Head of Arts, Head of Sports, Head of Academic, Head of Hauora plus the four Heads of Houses to discuss the organisation of student activities.

St Oran's College Student Council

Elected students from each year level at senior level and each class at junior level meet regularly with the Head of College Council and Deputy Principal to discuss issues raised by their peers, the needs of the College and activities for the school.

Reporting to Parents

In 2021 St Oran's College moved to a more 'real-time' reporting system. This means that rather than receiving a formal written report twice a year, reports are issued when students have been assessed or given learning feedback in a particular subject area.

Homework

The development of effective study habits and time management are an important life skill. Homework is set in most subjects each night in the junior school and each student should have a homework timetable. Parents can contact their daughter's Dean should they have challenges meeting their workload. At senior level (Years 11-13) homework will cover a range of follow on activities for the day's learning.

Newsletters

The school newsletter is published approximately once per term. A link to this is sent to families and whānau via email and it is upload to the St Oran's website www.storans.school.nz.

Friday Flyer

The Friday Flyer is published every Friday afternoon and advises of upcoming weekly events. This can be found on our website www.storans.school.nz.

Canteen

The Canteen is open every day for morning tea and lunch. A range of food is offered, with the emphasis on health. The Canteen has been the recipient of three Heart Beat Awards. Pre-paid meal combo cards are available for purchase so students do not need to bring cash or Eftpos cards to school.

Extra-Curricular Activities and Special Interests

St Oran's College staff strive to recognise students' individual strengths and interests and seek to develop them.

Music

The St Oran's College Music Department offers music for all year levels, from junior to senior. Both the module junior and elective senior classes provide opportunities for exploring creative ideas in composition, performance and musical appreciation. The music programme explores many different genres and gives students a solid grounding in this discipline.

We have a strong itinerant programme which enables students at St Oran's to learn music on-site. Our itinerant tutors include some of the most talented and high profile performance musicians in the Wellington region. Participation in school music groups is high. We currently have a School Choir, Orchestra and Band. Singing Assemblies occur regularly giving the entire school an opportunity to create music on a regular basis.

Sport

On the sports field enthusiastic staff, senior students and parents put in many hours of coaching and managing time for inter-school competitions or for leisure time activities. We offer a wide variety of sports including the following:

Winter: Badminton, Basketball, Hockey, Netball, Soccer

Summer: Cricket, Tennis, Touch, Volleyball, School Athletics and Swimming

Young New Zealanders Duke of Edinburgh Hillary Award

St Oran's College is an independent operating authority for the Award, and many students are working towards the awards. Each year several students reach Gold Award level. Continuation of this scheme is dependent on staffing.

Many other activities such as Debating, Helping Hands Service Group, and a Christian Group complete the varied programme, and the sharing of talent and interest ensures that formal education is well supplemented.

Students are encouraged to take part in activities outside the classroom and to develop their interests and talents. This is an essential part of developing into a well-rounded person.

Special Programmes

Education Outside the Classroom

This is another area where wide-ranging life skills are further developed. Year 7 students go to a three day camp which involves a variety of activities which help students get to know each other and to develop trust, co-operation and communication skills as well as Outdoor Education skills. A varying range of outdoor education opportunities are also provided for Years 8, 9, 10 and 12.

Peer Support

This programme provides a small group setting where Year 7 students meet with trained senior students. This is a programme set up in Term 1 each year involving Year 7 and Year 13 students in which trained senior students support the new students to settle in to the college, meet new people and develop confidence.

Learning Support

Learning Support is available for individual students or groups of students for specific learning areas identified. This is available to students at all levels.

Careers Education

Students at all levels have access to the Careers Advisor. The Advisor provides careers counselling, supplies information, assists with curriculum vitae development and interview skills. Liaison visits from tertiary education institutions and other career areas take place at several times throughout the year.

There is a careers website with information for students and our school community to peruse. This is on our school website with a link under the Student tab.

The school has a range of opportunities to assist students to explore careers pathways within our local community and further afield.

Deans and Whānau Group teachers are also available to students to discuss their career aspirations.

Curriculum

Students in Years 9 and 10 study all the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and Physical Education/Health. In addition, students rotate through three modules for 1/3 of the year. This includes Te Reo Māori, Digital Technology, Exploring Faith and Literacy.

At Year 9 level students select four subject choices (options) that are timetabled for three spells per week for half the year. Students must choose two options from each of the strands below.

All Year 11 students at St Oran's must study six subjects. This programme of study is made up of two types of subjects: Three compulsory subjects of English, Mathematics and Science, and three additional subjects chosen by the student.

Year 12 students take English, and a further four optional subjects.

All students will have one spell per week of Exploring Faith to support and extend our schools special character.

The Wellbeing Strand is also offered at Year 12. It is designed to support students in meeting the demands of a Level 2 course. Throughout this strand there will be the opportunity for some physical activity, to learn about nutrition for health, strategies for healthy living, study support as well as independent study time. There is no assessment in this strand.

At Year 13 students take a course of five subjects. Students may apply to the Deputy Principal if they wish to study six subjects.

Students who wish to go on to University are advised to choose five subjects at NCEA Level 3. If you mix Level 3 and Level 2 courses, you must carefully check that you can fulfil the requirements for university entrance. Checking this in February is a good safeguard. You will also want to achieve the GES (Guaranteed Entry Score).

Parents' Association

A very active Parents' Association supports St Oran's College. Members organise family activities and social occasions for parents and students. Fund-raising is a significant part of the Association's function, and many school facilities have been provided from Parents' Association funds.

St Oran's College Enrolment Scheme

The Ministry of Education has required the Board of Trustees to put in place an enrolment scheme for applications made for entry to the College. The Board is required to work within the **maximum roll under the Integration Agreement.**

The Integration Agreement states that "A preference of enrolment at the School...shall be given to those pupils with parents who have established a particular or general connection with the special character of the School..."

Each year, within 60 days of the closing date for applications, the Board of Proprietors will, identify all 'preference applicants' whose parents/guardians have applied to enrol them in the College in the following year.

The Board of Proprietors will pass this list of preference applicants to the Board of Trustees.

The first two priority groups set out below apply to **Preferential applicants only**.

First Priority:

Priority to preference applicants for whom the school is 'reasonably convenient'. The Education Amendment Act accepts that the definition of 'reasonably convenient' for an Integrated School such as St Oran's College, given that we serve the Special Character needs of the Wellington district, will be greater than for a State School. The area of 'reasonably convenient' is outlined on the map provided with this Enrolment Scheme, and can be described as follows:

The area of reasonable convenience encompasses students who live within the city limits of the Wellington, Lower Hutt, Upper Hutt and Porirua City Councils bounded by:

- Upper Hutt north to the top of the Rimutaka Hill.
- Porirua north to, and including, Pukerua Bay.

Should applications within this region exceed the number of places available, then the allocation of places will be made in the following order:

- a) Sisters of students who are currently attending the College.
- b) Sisters of students who have attended the college.
- c) The daughters of permanent staff who are employed by the College, or the daughters of Ministers who provide regular liturgy at the College Chapel services.
- d) Daughters of those who have or have had a role in a key school organisation/s over an unbroken period of at least three years.
- e) Other Preferential Students:

In each of categories of (a) - (d) above, girls will be listed in order of receipt of their applications. St Oran's College will use its "waiting list" which records the date at which application was received. In each of the categories, available

places will be offered to girls in the order in which their names occur on the waiting list for a particular year of entry.

If at this point the number of preferential students remaining exceeds the number of places remaining, then enrolment will be determined by date at which application was received.

Second Priority:

Preferential students whose place of residence is outside the area decreed reasonably convenient. If places remain for allocation to students in this priority group, selection will be by the same means as that specified for students with first priority status.

Third Priority:

If all preferential applicants for places can be enrolled, the college is able to enrol a limited number of non-preference students (up to 5% of the maximum number of students in any one year). Among non-preference students, priority will be selected by the same "stepped" enrolment process used for preference students.

Selection:

The selection process described for students in priority groups I, 2, and 3 above will operate at each level, depending on the number of places deemed by the Principal to be available at each year level. In any year, however, very few places are likely to be available at Year 8 - 13.

Pre-enrolment:

Each year, applications for enrolment will be sought by a date which will be published in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school. Applications for places will not be accepted after this date.

Informing Parents: Within 90 days of the closing date for applications, parents will be informed of their daughter's place on the waiting liSt If places become available at a later date, places will be offered to girls in the order of their place on the waiting liSt

The waiting list will remain operative only until March in the year of enrolment. (No numbered waiting list will be carried over to succeeding years).

Determination of Preference

Determination of Preference is specified in the Integration Agreement as follows:

'A preference of enrolment at the School under Section 29(1) of the Integration Act shall be given to those pupils with parents who have established a particular or general connection with the special character of the School.

The Board shall not give preference of enrolment to the parents of any child unless the Proprietor has confirmed that those parents have established a particular or general connection with the special character of the School to the satisfaction of representatives of the Wellington Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church (The Board of Proprietors).'

In granting preference, the Board of Proprietors will give consideration to the following criteria (in no particular order) in conjunction with the enrolment application questionnaire:

- Active involvement of your family in a church (of any denomination), to be supported by a letter from your minister or church leader.
- Families who demonstrate their commitment to, and participation in, the Special Character of the School.
- Sister of a past or current student
- Daughter of an old girl of the School.
- Families who have a significant association with the School.

The Board of Proprietors determines preference on a case by case basis. The Board has the discretion to decide which applicants are granted preference, regardless of whether or not they meet some of the above criteria.

Application Process for Entry at Year 7 Level

- **Step 1** Place your daughter on our pre-enrolment waiting list system. Forms are available here. As applications greatly exceed places available we encourage you to submit this form as early as possible.
- **Step 2** In mid-February of the year that your daughter is in Year 6 at primary school we will email you an application pack. This must be submitted with any requested documentation by 4.00pm on 31st March.
- **Step 3** The Board of Proprietors Admissions Committee will review all applications and determine if a student is Preference or Non-Preference. Please see the Determination of Preference section above.
- **Step 4** If there are more Preference applications than places available, applications are prioritised in accordance with the Ministry of Education approved Enrolment Scheme. Please see the Enrolment Scheme above.
- **Step 5** At the end of Term 1, emails are sent to all applicants informing them if their daughter is considered a Preference or Non-Preference applicant, and their number on the appropriate waiting liSt Approximately 85 Preference students will be invited in for an interview. If not invited for an interview, families will be asked to confirm that they would like their daughter to remain on the waiting list for consideration.
- **Step 6** At the end of Term 2, emails are sent to families informing them whether their daughter is offered a place for Year 7 in the following year, or the number she is placed on the Preference or Non-Preference waiting liSt
- **Step 7** In March of the following year (in which your daughter is in Year 7) the Preference and Non-Preference waiting lists are disbanded. An email will be sent to you to confirm if you would like your daughter to remail on the waiting list for consideration for a place. As long as you reply to this email then your daughter will remain on the waiting list for Year 7 and the start of Year 8.
- **Step 8 -** Emails will be sent to you annually thereafter, to confirm if you would like your daughter to remain on the waiting list.

As an integrated school, the Government funding that the College receives is considerably less than a state school. It is an expectation that the St Oran's College parent community will support the school to cover all non-operational costs.
